District 20 RTOERO is proud of its heritage and achievements. It is an organization bursting with opportunities to get involved in both the business of the District and the legacy it is building through community partnerships. In 1968, The Superannuated Teachers of Ontario (STO) formed an organization to safeguard and promote the professional welfare of their 7,000 superannuated members. They were later known as RTO/ERO and more recently as RTOERO.

When the first Senate Meeting of Superannuated Teachers of Ontario was held in March 1968, the voting delegates were representative of the five affiliates of the Ontario Teachers' Federation (OTF). Later that year, an Extension Committee was established to organize STO into geographic Areas across the province based upon the provincial county board system. On December 4, 1968, the areas were set up:

Area 1 / Fort WilliamArea 2 / Sault Ste. MarieArea 3 / North Bay AreaArea 4 / WindsorArea 5 / WaterlooArea 6 / St. CatharinesArea 7 / Dufferin, Peel, Malton, SimcoeArea 8 / TorontoArea 9 / PeterboroughArea 10 / Ottawa

In 1972, to keep the membership informed and interested and to get suitable persons to meet with members of the legislature, the province was reorganized into Districts. In 1973, the necessary changes were made to the Constitution and some adjustments were made to the composition of Districts.

RTOERO District 20 was formed May 1, 1973, as STO/ERO District 20. In 1998 The Superannuated Teachers of Ontario became The Retired Teachers of Ontario (RTO/ERO) and District 20 became RTO/ERO District 20. (In 2020 RTO/ERO became a Canada-wide organization with members from various education sector roles and became simply RTOERO.) RTO/ERO District 20 included retired educators from Frontenac, Leeds & Grenville and Lennox and Addington counties. The first executive consisted of Lawson Orser as President and Helen Hay as Secretary-Treasurer.

Located in eastern Ontario, the District is a blend of both urban and rural communities. The largest city, Kingston, is located along the shores of Lake Ontario. To the west is the town of Napanee and to the east, Gananoque. The District also extends north to include Denbigh and Sharbot Lake. The vast geographical size of the District was a concern from the outset and an attempt was made to address the issue in 1975 by endeavouring to divide the District into more manageable areas. This was not the will of the membership at the time and separation wasn't achieved until 2011 when Leeds and Grenville became District 48 and Frontenac, Lennox and Addington was retained as District 20.

District 20 is rich in history, geography and culture. Residents are proud of their Loyalist heritage as attested to by the geographic domination of Fort Henry in the city of Kingston. Stretching from the Canadian Shield to the Thousand Islands, the area is a lively tourist destination. Kingston is also an academic hub, home to Queens University including Macarthur College Faculty of Education, the Royal Military College, St. Lawrence College, the Federal Staff College and the National Defense College at Fort Frontenac.

District 20 has the opportunity to recruit members from this wide range of institutions as well as from OSSTF, ETFO, OECTA and AEFO and the administrative and support staff of both the

Limestone DSB and the Algonquin and Lakeshore CDSB. Current membership is 1401 members.

District 20's Executive has also expanded since its formation in 1973 and now includes members responsible for Political Action, Awards, Member Services, Goodwill, Benefits, Environmental Stewardship, Travel and Communication.

Reaching the membership has evolved from the initial use of telephone trees to a webpage, email news blasts, Facebook and Twitter usage and continues to engage members through a vibrant newsletter entitled Vision 20/20. The current President is Juanita Everett.

Although District 20 is a large area, it is a tight-knit community of education workers. The District has always endeavored to provide inclusion opportunities for the more rural north, western and central members. Meetings and social events occur regularly in Sharbot Lake, Napanee and Kingston.

District 20 has been able to contribute to the communities within our District through a variety of volunteer opportunities, charitable donations and corporate sponsorships. The scope of the Community Grants have included donations to literacy programmes, food banks, and seniors' associations in Kingston, Napanee, Sharbot Lake and North Addington.

As well, District 20 RTOERO has enhanced its image through corporate sponsorship for local organizations including the Frontenac County Schools Museum, the Kingston Seniors Association and the Kingston Robotics Lab (Machine Mavericks). In 2001 District 20 established the Irwin Ruttle Award to honour the long-standing contributions of Irwin Ruttle, Secretary-Treasurer for over 20 years. The award recognizes the outstanding voluntary contributions to the work of RTOERO at the District level. It has been awarded six times since its inception. The first award was presented to Irwin Ruttle followed by Wayne Tompkins (2006), Ken Keyes (2007), Meikle Turner (2012), W. Bud Acton (2013), Sylvia Dopking (2014), Nadene Strange (2015) and John Kitney (2018). The recipient receives a certificate and a \$500 donation given to a charitable organization of their choosing.

District 20 is proud of the professionalism and volunteerism of all its members.

Several prominent members have served RTOERO as President of the Provincial Association in Toronto: Lawson Orser (1985-1986) and Wayne Tompkins (1999-2000).

District 20 is also very proud of the contributions of our member and past president Ken Keyes. Ken was mayor of the city of Kingston from 1976 until 1981 and an M.P.P. from 1985 to 1990.

In 2018 Madeleine Wotherspoon received the June Szeman Award created by RTOERO to recognize members in each of the 48 Districts for their leadership and exceptional work in furthering the goals of RTOERO at the District level.

Recently, notable District 20 members include David Kendall who sits on the RTOERO Board of Directors and Ted Whiteland who acts as Chair of the RTOERO Foundation Board. The Foundation awards grants between ten and fifteen thousand dollars to projects that aim to improve seniors' health and wellness, promote social engagement for older adults and or pursue innovative research in the field of geriatrics and gerontology.

Unique activities distinguish District 20 from other Districts across Canada. One is the annual back to school breakfast, "To 'ell with the Bell". This social event, begun by Alice Hogeboom, re-unites former colleagues from across the District to celebrate retirement. We especially encourage new retirees to attend. Today 30-40 members gather to enjoy the annual fellowship and to share memories of past school days.

Another noteworthy aspect of District 20 is its travel programme. This was initiated in 1997 as Meikle and Margaret Turner undertook the first tour to Ireland. Over the years, participants have had the opportunity to visit every continent with multiple excursions to Ireland, Italy and long stays in Portugal. These travel leaders also organized more local selections with theatre excursions and fall colour tours. In 2013 John and Karen Kitney assumed leadership of the Kingston and Area Retired Teachers Travel Committee (KARTTC) in collaboration with Nadene Strange. After a three-year hiatus due to COVID restrictions, KARTTC is looking forward to offering new travel opportunities to District 20 members.

Of special note is the establishment of the Les Forkes Memorial Intergenerational Student Leadership Scholarship in 2022. Two Scholarships are available to secondary school graduating students who show passion and willingness to pursue studies that will benefit seniors.
